



# California 501(c)(3) Benefits You May Be Missing

## Common and Hidden Advantages for California Non-Profits

- Core and Well-Known Benefits
- Less Common or Nuanced Benefits in California

Core and well-known benefits are the widely recognized advantages most non-profits already use, while the less common or nuanced benefits are often overlooked opportunities unique to California that can unlock hidden value for your organization.

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# Core and Well-Known Benefits

These are the fundamental advantages that most 501(c)(3) organizations are aware of and typically leverage.

## Tax & Financial Benefits

- Federal Income Tax Exemption – 501(c)(3) organizations are exempt from federal income taxes.
- Tax-Deductible Donations for Donors – Contributions to a 501(c)(3) organization are tax-deductible, increasing donor appeal.
- State Income Tax Exemption** – Eligible non-profits can apply for California franchise and income tax exemptions through the Franchise Tax Board (FTB Form 3500 or 3500A).
- Property Tax Exemption** – Non-profits may qualify for property tax exemption under California's Welfare Exemption (BOE-267 Form).
- Sales and Use Tax Exemption** – Certain purchases may be exempt from California sales tax, such as food for the needy or educational materials.

# Core and Well-Known Benefits (cont.)

## Fundraising & Grant Opportunities

- Eligibility for Private & **Government** Grants – Many private foundations and government agencies require 501(c)(3) status to qualify for grants.
- Matching Gift Programs – Many corporations match their employees' donations to non-profits, doubling the contributions.
- Corporate Giving Programs – Companies often donate to 501(c)(3) organizations due to tax benefits and public goodwill. **Google**. **Microsoft**. **Adobe**. **Slack**.
- **Reduced Postage Costs** (USPS Non-Profit Bulk Mailing Rates) – Access to discounted postal rates for outreach and donor communications.
- Access to **Google Ad Grants** – Google provides \$10,000 per month in free advertising credits to eligible non-profits.
- **Raffles & Charitable Gaming Benefits** – 501(c)(3)s can legally conduct charitable raffles with a permit from the California DOJ.
- Peer-to-Peer Fundraising & Online Giving – Platforms like **Blackbaud**, and other **crowdfunding sites** allow non-profits to accept donations at reduced fees.

# Core and Well-Known Benefits: Operational and Government

## Operational Benefits

- Enhanced Credibility & Public Trust** – 501(c)(3) status enhances legitimacy and public confidence, making partnerships and funding easier to secure.
- Limited Liability Protection** – Directors and officers are minimally shielded from **personal liability** related to organizational activities.
- Exemption from **Corporate Minimum Tax** – Unlike for-profits, 501(c)(3)s are exempt from California's \$800 minimum franchise tax.

## Government & Regulatory Benefits

- Priority for **Government Contracts** – Many California state and local governments set aside contracts for non-profits to **deliver social services**.
- Expedited Permits & Zoning Considerations** – Some localities offer fast-track permitting for non-profits working on community projects.
- Access to County & **State** Surplus Property – Some **government agencies** allow 501(c)(3)s to purchase surplus property at reduced costs.
- Eligibility for **Nonprofit Security Grants**
- Take advantage of all Public Access resources such as **Computers**

# Less Common or Nuanced Benefits

These are specialized advantages that non-profits may not commonly utilize but can provide significant operational and financial benefits.

## Specialized Tax & Financial Perks

- **Unrelated Business Income Tax (UBIT) Exemptions** – Certain passive income streams (e.g., **property rentals**) may be tax-exempt if mission-aligned.
- Non-Profit Loan & **Credit Programs** – Some **CDFIs** (Community Development Financial Institutions) offer low-interest loans tailored for non-profits.
- **Energy Efficiency Rebates & Grants** – California utilities offer grants for non-profits to install solar panels and energy-efficient systems.

## Reduced Costs for Essential Services

- Discounted Business Services & Software – Platforms like **TechSoup** provide non-profits with heavily discounted software (**Microsoft**, **Google**, **Adobe**, **Slack**, **Salesforce**, etc.).
- **Lower Fees for Incorporation & Compliance** – Non-profits pay reduced fees for filings with the California Secretary of State.
- Discounted **Insurance Rates** – Some insurers offer **non-profit-specific** policies at reduced rates.
- **Reduced Internet & Phone Costs** – Some telecom providers offer special pricing for non-profits.

## Property, Real Estate & Facility Benefits

- Discounted or **Free Public Facility Use** – Many California cities offer low-cost or **free meeting spaces** to 501(c)(3) organizations.
- Access to Land for Community Use – Programs like **California's Land Trust** Network help non-profits acquire or lease land at lower costs.
- **Fiscal Sponsorship Opportunities** – New non-profits can operate under an existing 501(c)(3)'s umbrella to access tax benefits without incorporation.

# Additional Specialized Benefits



## Employment & Workforce Development

- Exemption from Some State Employment **Taxes** – Some 501(c)(3)s may opt out of California's State Unemployment Tax (SUTA) **if they self-insure**.
- Intern & Workforce Development Grants** – California offers subsidized intern and employment **programs for non-profits**.
- Non-Profit Student Loan Forgiveness** – Employees of 501(c)(3)s qualify for Public Service Loan Forgiveness (PSLF) after 10 years of work.



## Marketing & Public Relations Perks

- Social Media Fundraising Benefits – **Facebook** and Instagram allow registered 501(c)(3)s to collect donations with no processing fees.
- Media** & Public Awareness **Support** – Some local governments offer free promotion of non-profit events via public TV or websites.
- Special Recognition & **Awards** – California-based non-profits are often eligible for exclusive funding, grants, and **community awards**.



## Advocacy, Compliance & Legal Perks

- Access to Pro Bono Legal & Consulting Services – Organizations like Public Counsel and the **Taproot Foundation** offer free legal aid.
- State-Level Advocacy Networks – Non-profits can join groups like **CalNonprofits** to influence policy and network with decision-makers.
- Exemptions from **Political Contribution Laws** – Unlike PACs, 501(c)(3)s are exempt from campaign finance restrictions, as long as they avoid political activity.



## Disaster Relief & Emergency Benefits

- Priority Access to **FEMA & State Emergency Funds** – 501(c)(3) non-profits qualify for federal and state disaster relief funding.
- Special Emergency Services Contracts – Some non-profits receive government contracts to assist in **disaster relief efforts**.

# How to Maximize These Benefits

To fully leverage these benefits, non-profits should:

-  **Apply for federal & state tax exemptions**  
IRS Form 1023, California FTB Form 3500
-  **Register with the California Attorney General**  
For compliance and fundraising rights
-  **Leverage corporate & tech discounts**  
Google Ad Grants, TechSoup, Microsoft Nonprofit Programs
-  **Utilize fiscal sponsorship**  
If not yet incorporated to access benefits without forming a new entity
-  **Join local and state non-profit advocacy groups**  
To access funding opportunities and influence policy

## Final Thoughts

The core benefits of 501(c)(3) status offer significant tax, fundraising, and credibility advantages, but California non-profits can tap into lesser-known benefits such as specialized tax breaks, workforce grants, property access, and discounted services.
